

CLOSING CHAPTER EVENT

The Philadelphia Chapter's June season finale is a once in a lifetime opportunity to meet and greet one of the great composers of the twentieth century, Daniel Pinkham. The event is Sunday, June 12, and begins at 4:00 pm at Arch Street Presbyterian Church with a concert of Pinkham's organ works played by Andrew Paul Holman. Daniel Pinkham needs very little introduction. Most of us have grown up aware of him as a composer, and have studied and performed his music. Holman is closely associated with Pinkham and is well-known for his performances and recording of the composer's organ works. The concert will include the premier of *Lections*, a new 12 minute multi-movement organ work. The program will also include *Collects*, *Saints' Days*, and *The Four Winds*, all multi-movement works for organ.

Dr. Pinkham has composed extensively for the organ contributing significantly to the literature. See www.danielpinkham.net for a list of his works. He was born in Massachusetts in 1923. Among others, he studied with Walter Piston, Aaron Copland, Putnam Aldrich, Wanda Landowska, E. Power Biggs, Arthur Honegger, Samuel Barber, and Nadia Boulanger. Andrew Paul Holman is a graduate of Luther College (Iowa) and the New England Conservatory of Music. His concerts in this country often

am amazed at how quickly these last two years have flown by. I have thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to serve you and this fine organization as dean. Our chapter is in excellent shape with strong membership support and many recent successful events.

Let me share with you some of the things that have occurred during this time.

- We finally got our chapter website up and running, thanks to Roy Harker. For the past year, webmaster responsibilities have been in the hands of Ken Anderson.
- Programming has maintained a wide range of enriching opportunities for many of the facets of our art, thanks to Jeff Fowler and the Program Committee (Katherine Reier, Phil Shade, HL Smith, Jeremy Zuck). This is a group that has accepted a high level of responsibility, and has never let us down.
- Communication within our chapter includes the *Crescendo*, where editor Carl Gedeik leads the team of Roy Harker (publisher), Katherine Reier (circulation manager), and Tim Evers (Calendar of Events) to keep our membership informed.
- Additional information is sent to members via e-mail by Jeff Fowler, whose computer skills have been a great asset to all of us.
- The Vision Task Force, implemented by the Executive Committee early in 2003, chaired by Rae Ann Anderson and David Furniss, continues to meet and work toward a plan for our future.
- The Operating Procedures Task Force has been working on adapting and updating the chapter's Operating Procedures. This task is nearing completion, and has been introduced in draft form to the Executive Committee for possible approval this spring. Chaired by David Furniss, other committee members are: Ria Ellis, Roy Harker, Catherine Robinson, Phil Shade, and Ethel Geist and Jeff Fowler, *ex officio*.
- We are on the road to an exciting venture, a *DemoInfo*, to be held on October 9th. We hope to add a substantial number of organ students to the roles of musicians in the Philadelphia area.
- Under the leadership of Marcia Mau, the Pipe Organ Encounter for June, 2006, has received approval from AGO Headquarters, and is moving along well in the planning stages.
- We now have "e" delivery of the Crescendo for those who choose to receive it that way.
- Records of our chapter's past are growing through the efforts of Arthur Zbinden and Lois Ruth as they add to our archives.
- The reinstatement of the former practice of meeting for a meal prior to or following a chapter activity
 has brought many individuals into closer contact with each other. I sincerely hope we all continue to
 forge new friendships and networks with each other. That is one of the unique strengths of
 organizations such as ours.
- We congratulate the Friends of the Wanamaker Organ on their success in bringing the world of organ music to the listeners of WRTI on the first Sundays of each month at 5:00 pm. As a chapter, we support their efforts with all the encouragement and financial support we can, and encourage all members to do the same.
- As a chapter, we plan to celebrate the addition of the new Dobson organ to the Kimmel Center.

I would like to express my appreciation and the gratitude of the chapter to our officers: Jeff Fowler, subdean; Jerry Troy, treasurer; Ria Ellis, secretary; Sister Paula Napoli, corresponding secretary; and Joe Lewis, registrar. IN MEMORIAM

I am sorry to report the passing of two beloved members of the chapter:

Will Beck, a long time active member of the Philadelphia Chapter who lived in the Scranton area, died on April 12th at the age of 96. He was an Honorary Member since 1999. A Requiem Mass was sung for Will on Tuesday, May 3, at 2:30 P.M. at St. Mark's Church, 1625 Locust Street, Philadelphia, where he was later interred. Several of his friends provided special music. Memorial contributions may be made in his name to the Scholarship Fund of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, 125 E. Lancaster Ave., Wayne PA 19087.

David J. King, a long time Guild member, died April 17th. David was a church musician, recently at St. Francis Xavier Church in Philadelphia, and had been the head of the choral program at CAPA (The Creative and Performing Arts High School) until his retirement. David was a graduate of West Chester University, and was an organ student of Wesley Day. The funeral service was held at St. Francis deSales Church on Friday, April 22, 2005. He is survived by his widow, Maureen King.



include works by Scandinavian composers, and conversely he introduces American organ works to Scandinavian audiences. He has performed numerous premieres of organ works composed for him by Pinkham.

Following the concert, the chapter is hosting a dinner honoring Dr. Pinkham directly across the street from the church on the 51st floor of the Bell Atlantic Building at Top of the Tower (www.topofthetower.com). A 5:30 cash bar precedes a 6:30 dinner, choice of crab cakes or filet mignon. The price for the dinner is \$60. (See below for the details.) The Top of the Tower affords even better panoramic views of the Delaware Valley than the Pyramid Club, site of last season's June event.



KIMMEL CENTER SEEKS ORGANIST FOR NEW DOBSON PIPE ORGAN

Dobson Organ Op. 76 to be Unveiled at Kimmel Center Organ Festival in May 2006

In May 2006, The Kimmel Center unveils its brand new completed pipe organ by builder Lynn Dobson with an organ festival comprised of 14 events over 2 weeks, and is currently engaged in a search for a versatile performer to serve as the Kimmel Center's first Organist. The Dobson organ, Op. 76, will rank as one of the largest concert hall organs in the world when complete, with 6,938 pipes, three blowers, 300 levels of memory, 111 stops, pipe sizes ranging from that of about the size of a drinking straw up to two feet square by 32 feet in length, and a total weight of app. 32 tons. Verizon Hall will close for six weeks in the summer of 2005 to complete the installation.

The position will report to Mervon Mehta, Vice President for Programming and Education. "When complete, the new organ will significantly expand the repertoire and programming possibilities for Kimmel Center Presents, The Philadelphia Orchestra and other users of the hall" said Mehta. "We're looking for someone who will be a passionate and energetic advocate and can convey the significance of the pipe organ, its history, and music to diverse audiences ranging from highly educated enthusiasts to young students."

The Kimmel Center seeks a leader in the organ field with a deep knowledge of organ repertoire, strong improvisation skills, and the ability to perform in a variety of settings from organ/choral concerts to educational concerts, films, meetings and conventions, and occasionally as a recitalist and soloist for large orchestral works.

The Kimmel Center Organist will also serve as curator for the organ, advising the Center on the instrument's maintenance and improvements over time.

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COMING SOON: REVISED OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR OUR CHAPTER!

By David Furniss, Chair of the Operating Procedures Task Force

Much progress has been made in the last few months by the chapter's Operating Procedures Task Force. Established in September by the Executive Committee, this task force was charged with updating and rewriting the chapter's operating procedures to be more in tune with how we currently operate, as well as in tune with how we may envision operations in the near future. Groundwork for this task was begun several years ago by then Registrar James Slechta. With the project on the "back burner" for a few years, the current task force began its work on January 31, following the adoption of the chapter's new mission statement by the Executive Committee. Nine meetings later, the task force was ready to present its first draft to the Executive Committee for initial review at its May 2 meeting. Ultimately, as the chapter's governing body, the Executive Committee will make a decision on adopting the new procedures.

Chapter members may be interested in a few details of the process. First of all, our chapter is accountable to the National By-laws adopted in April, 1896, and amended through July, 2004 (available on line at www.agohq.org). The Philadelphia Chapter's current Operating Procedures ("a set of established forms or methods for conducting the affairs" of an organization) were adopted in February, 1987, and amended through October, 2004. In considering a means of rewriting our operating procedures, the task force chose to begin with the model suggested by the National AGO (also available at www.agohq.org), and modify as appropriate for our own chapter's needs. The resulting document, under consideration by the Executive Committee as of May 2, incorporates a few changes to our current ways of doing things. Information about these changes will be made available to the chapter membership through the Crescendo after the new document is finalized.

Many thanks to the members of the Operating Procedures Task Force for incredibly diligent and focused work over these past few months. It is probably no exaggeration to say that each and every word and concept of the Operating Procedures was carefully considered and discussed, with updates constantly and faithfully produced by our Chapter Secretary, Ria Ellis. Other members of the task force are: Roy Harker, Catherine Robinson, Phil Shade, Ethel Geist (*ex officio*), Jeff Fowler (*ex officio*), and David Furniss, Chair.





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


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
