# Chapter Event Diane Belcher, Organist Friday, October 22, 2004 8:00 PM

St. Monica Roman Catholic Church, 17th & Ritner Sts., Philadelphia

native of our area, Diane Belcher is no stranger to many members of the Philadelphia Chapter. In the forefront of American organists, she has performed throughout the United States for over twenty-five years, in addition to appearances in France and England. Diane made her solo recital debut at age 15, and received her degrees from The Curtis Institute of Music and The Eastman School of Music. She is a laureate of both the St. Albans (England) and Chartres (France) international organ competitions, and won the American Guild of Organists' top prize in its professional certification examinations. She was recently appointed Assistant Professor of Organ at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey.

She has performed regularly on the Wanamaker Grand Court Organ in Philadelphia, in duo-recital with trumpeter Rob Roy McGregor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and as soloist with numerous orchestras. In July 2002, she created a sensation performing the Jongen Symphonie Concertante with the Philadelphia Orchestra at the Girard College Chapel, receiving a thunderous standing ovation from the 2500+ members of the national AGO convention. A recipient of the 2000 Golden Ear Award for her premiere CD of the celebrated Glatter-Götz/Rosales organ in Claremont, California, her recordings are often broadcast on radio and television, including Public Radio International's Pipedreams.

Ms. Belcher has led numerous workshops and master classes, and is in demand as a competition juror, most recently at the Calgary International Organ Competition for 2002. She has been active as a church musician for nearly three decades, and was the founding director of the Memphis Concert Chorale. She is frequently asked to consult for church organ projects, and has commissioned and premiered several new organ compositions.

Laudatory reviews of her playing have appeared in such publications as Clavier, The New Records, The American Organist, Organists' Review, and The Diapason. She was named "Outstanding Keyboard Soloist of 1998" by the Arkansas Times. The German journal Orgel International states simply, "Diane Meredith Belcher's playing is exemplary in every respect", and American Record Guide calls her performances "glowingly brilliant, rhythmically vibrant, consistently expressive,

DEAN'S LETTER

Relationships and dealing with conflict are common concerns, and we, as AGO members, are not exempt.

With the permission of editor Evangeline Rimbach and the writers, I would like to share some thoughts from the June, 2004 issue of "Grace Notes," a publication of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. An advice column called "Dear St. Cecilia" (the patron saint of church musicians) is written by Ron Koch, a Lutheran Pastor and choir director, who does a skillshop on Assertiveness Training for

Church Musicians, and Kate Adelman, a church musician and consultant in the Phoenix area, who is also a licensed therapist.

In the last issue we wrote about some of the skills needed in staff relationships, especially where conflict arises. We mentioned the importance of having an attitude which is assertive without being aggressive and is respectful without being wimpish. In other words, be professional. Some of the skills we mentioned were listening and clarifying: responding with "I message" statements that aren't defensive or aggressive.

Sometimes we simply need some time to consider what our partners in ministry are suggesting. It is OK to say that you need some time to think something through. Rather than passively agreeing to suggestions or "orders," rather than disagreeing in a contentious manner, you can assert your need for time to think about it. Of course, you really do need to think about it and get back to the person and the issue in a timely fashion. We don't suggest that you use this skill as an avoidance tactic in hope that the issue goes away or resolves itself. "I need to think about that. I can get back to you tomorrow (or next week). OR "That's a new idea to me. I need to sleep on it a bit. Can we talk again tomorrow?"

Another skill to develop is the ability to revisit an issue. Sometimes we may agree to a set of hymns or an idea about a special service or a choir anthem, and then have second thoughts. Rather than going along with things passively or resentfully, we can do something about it: we can revisit the issue. Thus: "I was thinking about what we decided last week, and I'm not so sure about it any more. I have some things I'd like to talk about again." This is not an attack on the other person (aggressive), nor is it passively going along with a bad idea. It is healthy and helpful to revisit some issues because another idea might convey the message ...better. That needs to be the focus.

Sometimes the focus is clearly ...on you and you come under attack. Now what do you do? It's helpful to learn how to diffuse an attack. One of the things not to do is become defensive. It's almost as if your defensiveness seems to be an admission of responsibility for the basis of the attack. Attackers sense defensiveness and will continue to pursue when you are "on the run." Sometimes it's helpful to disclose how you feel; thus: "Ouch, that hurts and I'm feeling defensive. Can we talk about this in a more helpful way?" Sometimes it's helpful to restate the attack in a more neutral manner, thus: "You are upset about (issue), and we need to talk about it."

It's important to remember that conflict arises when there are two sides, two opinions, two ideas, two styles. When you are being attacked, it feels like there is only one "right" side, and it isn't yours. It's natural to want to defend your position, but don't be tempted. Rather, thus: "It seems that there is a problem, but I think that it is a wider problem than just me. The entire community (or staff) is affected, and I am willing to accept responsibility for my part. Others are involved and have some responsibility, too. It's better when we can look at the whole issue rather than scape-goating and blaming." These skills can certainly be used in relationships other than church-staff relationships. . . .

If you try these kinds of skills in ministry circumstances, there is no guarantee that all of your problems will be solved. It is our hope that the use of some of these skills will keep the conversation going....

Relationship skill building is a life-long process shaped by our natural personality, our experiences, and the context of our setting. Often there is more than one 'answer' or method that can better our situation.

Judy has received calls from chapter members embroiled in conflict or uncomfortable relationships, many of which could be resolved by some of the suggestions in Ron and Kate's article. In some cases, just talking about a problem with a wise listener can be helpful, while in other situations, a suggestion from a neutral party can open possibilities.

My wish for each of you is that you have no need of this kind of knowledge. But, just in case you need some of these ideas, I hope you will find them useful and productive.

class activities. Each session will be autonomous. Persons who enroll for Rowan University credit will be expected to write a paper at the end of the fourth session discussing the application of the information and strategies gained from the seminars to their own teaching/conducting situations.

Session One: Building Choral Sonority. (September 11) This session will deal with the vocal aspects of the choral ensemble, in-depth study of the vocal mechanism, focus of sound, vowels, and vowel modification, awareness of the passaggio, breath, and support.

Session Two: Developing Musical Skills in the Choral Rehearsal. (October 2) Techniques toward building musical literacy: intervals, rhythm and form will be emphasized. Score analysis for the conductor and the student will be covered. Solfeggio will be an integral part of this session.

Session Three: The Conducting Gesture as it Affects Sonority and Rhythmic Clarity. (October 23) This session will concentrate on dealing with complex meters, sustained sound, clarity of attack and release. Excerpts from standard choral works will be used. Special emphasis will be on a cappella music.

Session Four: Repertoire Considerations - Secondary Schools, Community and Church Chorses, College/University Choirs. (November 6) Examination and discussion of specific repertoire: how to select repertoire for your choir, what to look for musically, vocally and rhythmically. Discussion of style will be an important facet of this session.

## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

reetings AGO members! Our Dean, Ethel Geist, and I started a conversation when we had our small group meetings about having a chaplain. We were able to get back to the conversation this summer, and she asked if I would be the chaplain and I accepted. My responsibilities at this point will be to write a monthly chaplain's column here in the *Crescendo*, to attend as many chapter events as I can, and to be available on a limited basis for pastoral care and other negotiated duties.

I am an ELCA pastor with a BA in Church Music from Gustavus Adolphus College, a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia, and a Master of Arts in Pastoral Counseling from the Moravian Seminary in Bethlehem. My call is to the psychological practice of John C. Williams, M.A. in Doylestown. I am hired to lead the contemporary worship group at Family of God Lutheran Church in Buckingham.

I grew up in a small town in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan called Rapid River. My music responsibilities began in eighth grade playing for the Sunday School Openings. By the time I was in the 10th grade I was directing the choirs and playing the organ at my home church and the country church to which we were yoked. My parents are still living there, and my sister and her husband live in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

My involvement with the AGO has been on the worship committee for the National Convention and playing at Noontime Recitals. With the number of responsibilities that are required or expected, our purpose and basis for who we are and whose we are can easily get lost.

I do not expect everyone to agree with me or with each other, but, as church musicians/worship leaders, I believe we have an awesome responsibility to God first. 
