Organ Crawl: Remarks, Demo, Open Console

ONE CHURCH'S STORY OF ITS LONG STRUGGLE AND PATH TO A NEW ORGAN.

n the last 15 years, Trinity Lutheran Church in Perkasie assembled three organ committees to deal with the problem of an inadequate instrument installed in 1970. The third and last of the committees persevered, weathering financial concerns of the congregation through the dark days of the aftermath of Sept. 11, 2001. We finally saw the dream become reality in the form of Reuter's Opus 2214, a three-manual, 44 rank (Reuter with Walker digital) instrument.

March 5 offers you an opportunity to see a new instrument and to walk into the Great chamber, which is easily accessible. Dennis Elwell, the consultant for this process; Alan Bruzas, chair of the organ committee; host Ethel Geist; and Bill Fenimore, Reuter's representative, will talk briefly about how this project developed. We will hear demonstrations of the organ, including some of the MIDI capabilities. Dennis, Alan, Ehtel, and Bill will be available to answer any questions. All who would like to play it may take a turn.

DEAN'S LETTER

The Roman god Janus is often depicted around New Year's Day with his two faces, one looking backwards and one looking forwards. Although it's March, I think Janus is a good image to reflect current important happenings in our chapter.

For quite a while, members of the chapter leadership have been frustrated with our outdated Operating Procedures. When they were adopted in 1987, they carefully described what should be happening in the chapter, and how things should be done. Over the years, things have changed, and, although we have lived by the spirit of the Operating Procedures, we have realized that it is time to make some changes.



About five years ago, Jim Slechta, who was our registrar and one of our very knowledgeable chapter members, took on the daunting task of updating the Operating Procedures so they would reflect what actually takes place in the life of the chapter. About a year and a half ago, I talked with David Furniss about leading the next phase of this effort, and he agreed to assume this responsibility.

During this same period of time, in February, 2003, a task force was launched by the Executive Committee to take a good hard look at our chapter and to propose directions for our future. The Vision Task Force, co-chaired by Rae Ann Anderson and David Furniss, has taken an in-depth look into the past of our chapter, carefully assessing who we are as a chapter, noting our strengths and weaknesses, threats to our future, and opportunities we would like to use to our advantage. By late 2004, the Task Force recommended a Mission Statement, which was approved by the Executive Committee at our January 3, 2005, meeting.

As announced in the February Crescendo, our new chapter mission statement reads:

"The Philadelphia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists is a professional organization whose varied members are committed to advocacy of the art of the organ through education, professional development, and performance."

Now that we have determined who we are and where we are going, the Vision Task Force will develop a set of vision statements which will assist in providing direction as we formulate strategies for our chapter's future.

Even more important and immediate, we now have a tool to guide us as we start rewriting our Operating Procedures, which will be happening by the time this reaches you.

This is an exciting time to be involved in this incredible chapter with so many people of varying skills and abilities who are willing to contribute to the welfare of our art and our future.

I would like to recognize and thank those participating in these groups that are so important.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Bringing Hymns to All AgesMib Campbell

ymns are a vital part of our musical heritage and the true backbone of our sacred music. As new hymnody is constantly written, we all experience the perennial controversy of 'new' vs. 'classical / traditional' choices of hymns for our services. Purists have historically condemned the use of certain types of music in church as being too common and not suitable. For example, In Dulci Jubilo, the tune we generally associate with "Good Christian Men, Rejoice" and with many beautiful Chorale Prelude settings for organ, started as a German folk tune in the 14th century and was not met with open arms by all! The current controversy with that hymn over six centuries later is the use of inclusive language - "Good Christian Folk." But hymns persist and evolve, and each generation wrestles with new comers and old favorites.

I am a firm believer in the importance of teaching hymns of ALL types to children and young people. This approach helps pass down the beautiful traditions of centuries of hymnody to them. Their newly found enthusiasm for hymnody can also spur them to teach newer music to their elders. The following are a few techniques that I have used and found very successful.

Purists have historically condemned the use of certain types of music in church as being too common and not suitable. For example, In Dulci Jubilo, the tune we generally associate with "Good Christian Men, Rejoice" and with many beautiful Chorale Prelude settings for organ, started as a German folk tune in the 14th century and was not met with open arms by all!

Lyric Writing: Engaging youth in writing new verses for classic hymns can help them truly feel a relationship with those hymns. With younger children, I've done group writing, in which I solicit ideas from the group as a whole. For instance, we had an older woman requesting "Go Tell it On the Mountain" in the summer. So I decided to get Vacation Bible School children to help me write general praise verses to make it appropriate for the summer season. We began with 'Go tell it on the mountain, that Jesus Christ is here.' I encouraged thoughts about how Jesus is with us. Older children, after thoroughly learning a tune, can be encouraged to write their own verses. After 9/11, I had middle school youth write additional verses to Amazing Grace focusing on many of the issues within the aftermath of the tragedy.

Solo Verses: Hymns with a refrain are particularly suitable for younger children: small groups or soloists can sing the verses while the entire group sings the refrain.

Hymns with Handbell Accompaniment: We often use handbells (or tone chimes for younger players) to play the chords to hymns. These are easily written out by marking the chord structure over the downbeat for each measure as needed. Chant lends itself beautifully to selectively placed bells as well.

Chants: We have used seasonal chants such as *Parce Domine*. Children have a natural curiosity for and aptitude for learning language. One Christmas we were working on a Kyrie setting. I explained that the words were Greek, and asked if anyone had ever heard of Greece. One little girl said, "No, but I saw the movie!"

It's so very gratifying to hear children enthusiastically sharing a hymn. Happy singing!

Wednesday is already in the past, and Holy Week and Easter are coming soon.

The Holy Week liturgies always bring me some very meaningful spiritual moments. In the last three churches I have labored, I have introduced "The Adoration of the Cross." I believe that even in non-liturgical churches (which really don't exist) or in low church settings, this liturgy can be explained and become a part of the present Holy Week traditions.

This year in my church, I have suggested joining the Adoration of the Cross with Tenebrae. We will have a high school student (who is involved in drama at school) open the service with the opening versicles. Then we will sing "O Sacred Head Now Wounded" because there are very few other times to sing this great chorale. Next will be the Tenebrae, the reading of the Passion Story. What a good way to set up the meaning of the cross!

My suggestion is to always start slowly in order to educate. My homily will be the history of this liturgy and how we are doing it. This liturgy is just about the most solemn, somber service we have. It is important once in a while to truly contemplate the death of Jesus.

Fortunately the cross does not leave us at Jesus'death. It also signifies new and eternal life. Before Holy Week begins, try to find some quiet time to reflect on the meaning of the cross in your life. As busy as it is, I challenge you to find five to ten minutes in your rehearsals to reflect on the meaning of the cross. For what other purpose are we singing, ringing, and making music other than to proclaim the good news that "Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again"!!

May God bless you in this Holy season! May you grow in your relationship with God in Jesus Christ! May you continue to model your commitment!

Directions from 309:

- 1- From 309 north or south, take the Perkasie 563 exit —follow the Grand View Hospital sign. At the top of the ramp, turn away from the hospital onto Lawn Ave. (309N go left; 309S go right)
- 2- Go right at the traffic light (Ridge Road Rte. 563)
- 3- Go through two traffic lights, then go right onto Market Street. (Market dead-ends into Ridge Road, so watch closely it's just after the Wicky Wacky Wicker World; the corner has a tattoo parlor.)
- 4- Stay on Market Street though the cemetery and through the town to the traffic light at Fifth. Go right on Fifth. Trinity is at the end of the block.

On-street parking is fine. For alternative parking, go left onto Chestnut and right onto Fourth to the church's parking lot. At the front of the church, the glass handicapped-accessible doors will be open; at the back of the church, the single door which opens to the back parking area will be open. Directions will be posted.
