he International Congress of Organists was held once in the United States: Philadelphia in 1977. There, the young New York organist, David Hurd, walked away with the two most prestigious organ prizes of that day, the ICO's First Prize in Organ Performance AND the ICO's First Prize in Organ Improvisation. Two decades later David Hurd is widely recognized as one of the foremost church musicians and concert organists in the country. Since 1976, David has worked at The General Theological Seminary of the Episcopal Church in New York City. In the late eighties, three other seminaries awarded him honorary doctorates for his contributions to church music. Dr. Hurd is the composer of dozens of choral and organ works published by a number of major houses. As a concert organist he enjoys increasing recognition both at home and abroad.

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AN'S LETTE

s the glass half full, or is it half empty? For those of us involved in any facet of the organ world, speculating about the future can be reassuring or it can be troubling.

In March we experienced the loss of another organ builder as Austin closed. Many organ departments continue to face decreasing enrollments, and some are losing department status. And yet, if we are to be objective, there have been a number of positive occurrences that need to be recognized.

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The Spring, 2005, issue of The Stentor, the Journal of The Friends of the Wanamaker Organ, Inc., shares information about their recent successful organ programming with WRTI at 5:00 pm on the first Sunday of each month. This issue includes part of Michael Barone's (PipeDreams) interview with Peter Richard Conte in which Michael asked Peter, "What is your sense of the future for the organ in general...?" Peter's answer in part: "Oh, I think it's very much alive. I've seen in the past few years some of the most amazing young talent I have ever seen come through here.....I think audiences are coming back to organ concerts, slowly but surely and, as I said, the talent pool is going to explode in a few years. From what I've seen, there are some super talents out there, which is really encouraging."

As I read The Tracker, Journal of The Organ Historical Society from Fall, 2004, the first sentence of Agnes Armstrong's editorial jumped out at me as she quoted Walt Kelly: "We are confronted with insurmountable opportunities." She points out that "We all face magnificent opportunities every day of our lives. Sometimes these opportunities are brilliantly disguised as impossible situations. Yet their potential is real and it's up to each of us to affirm their inherent possibilities."

Take a look at the subscription information for the Philadelphia Orchestra's coming season, and notice the inclusion of the new Kimmel Center organ in the programming. It's becoming a reality!

For those in church positions, I'm reading and hearing more about quality instead of style recently. Thanks to Dennis Elwell, I was introduced to and impressed by an article, "Liturgy and Spiritual Formation: A Musician's Perspective" by Shelley Sanders Zuckerman, published by the Office of Theology and Worship, Presbyterian Church U.S.A. in *Call to Worship: Liturgy, Music, Preaching and the Arts* (Volume 38.2, 2004-2005). She describes how her choir had to work diligently on a difficult piece of music, and then observes this result: "Such music makes a lasting impression and deserves living with. Music that requires no investment, even for the congregation, is rarely worth repeating. Worship is not the context for disposable music." She also points out that "Music in worship must come from the heart. It cannot be disengaged and performed on autopilot. Neither, however, can it bull's-eye the heart as its goal, using the worship service to achieve a feel-good high or an emotional catharsis."" (The author is a PhD candidate in Liturgical Studies, leading to ordination. She has been a professional church musician for twenty years.)

The Louisville Statement, (see page 8) is another indicator of progress. About five years ago we had discussions in our chapter's Education Committee about the need for communication with seminaries and their students. If we work together, we can help build on this step forward to create a future with more harmonious relationships between clergy and musicians.

I'd like to share two books that were recommended to me recently by David Furniss and Jeff Fowler, which are now on my list of "must reading." The first is Thomas Long's *Beyond the Worship Wars: Building Vital and Faithful Worship*, published by The Alban Institute (ISBN 1-56699-240-0). The other is *Stones for Bread* by A. Daniel Frankforter, published by Westminster John Knox Press (ISBN 0-664-22284-6). I encourage you to keep up with publications, conversations and discussions involving trends in our world, and to be active in supporting and encouraging the progress and exposure that we as a profession need. Enjoy being part of our vocation and avocation, along with the magnificent opportunity to positively affect the future.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

THE LOUISVILLE STATEMENT

Since many of our chapter members are church musicians, the following statement should be of interest. For years clergy/musician working relationships have been topics of conversations and discussions. The Louisville Statement below is self-explanatory. I thank Sue Ellen Echard (Church of the Holy Spirit in Harleysville) for sharing it with us. In her note accompanying The Louisville Statement, Sue Ellen mentioned that the Church of the Holy Spirit's founding vicar, Anne Ritchings, was part of this highly respected group of clergy and musicians. She encourages all of us to share the information with diocesan committees, clergy, seminaries, etc., as it seems appropriate.

The Louisville Statement (February, 2005)

Worshipping communities of every size, location and tradition have an enormous potential to celebrate and make manifest the life-giving gospel of Jesus Christ through the power of liturgy and music.

When liturgy and music are used with creativity and wisdom, and when pastors and musicians work collegially to support vibrant worship, the riches of the gospel can be opened for all to share. When this is not done, the work of the Spirit can be unwittingly blocked, the gospel can be made dull, the depth of the experience of God can be made shallow, and the wisdom of the ages drained of meaning. music traditions and musicians who are informed liturgists can establish life-giving collaborations of mutual mentoring and mutual ministry. Grace and power can flow through effective worship planning, execution and review to enrich every aspect of congregational life. Alternatively, few faith communities can maintain renewal without a meaningful worship center.

These realizations lead us to believe that seminaries can offer education to clergy and musicians that will help create both the expectation and the resources for such collaboration. Judicatory authorities as well as committed congregational leaders can increase their emphasis on the importance of cooperation and mutual support by all whose ministry finds expression in the context of public worship.

We specifically

- Call for a review of seminary and music school processes with a goal of better preparing worship leaders for mutual ministry.

- Call upon various clergy and musician associations to explore opportunities for sharing.

- Call upon judicatories to consider the development of church musicians as well as clergy as they plan conferences and seminars.

- Call on congregations to equip, support and require their worship leaders to celebrate the Good news of Jesus Christ, to reach deeply into the experience of the living God, to draw generously on the diverse riches of tradition and to continue the miracles of Cana.

When liturgy and music are used with creativity and wisdom, and when pastors and musicians work collegially to support vibrant worship, the riches of the gospel can be opened for all to share. When this is not done, the work of the Spirit can be unwittingly blocked, the gospel can be made dull, the depth of the experience of God can be made shallow, and the wisdom of the ages drained of meaning.

There are far too many examples of this kind of liturgy for us to ignore. We believe that the celebratory wine of Cana should be shared in abundance through liturgy and music, and not turned back into water by lack of preparation, sensitivity and planning.

Therefore, we would like to put forth opportunities and resources that can keep this reversal from taking place.

We are pastors, teachers, church musicians and judicatory leaders representing Baptist, Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and United Methodist traditions. We met in Louisville, Kentucky, January 24 - 26, 2005 under the auspices of the Anglican Musicians' Seminary Music Initiative (AMSMI) and funded by a grant from the Louisville Institute to study the topic "Equipping Pastors to Use Music to Revitalize Congregations."

We have discovered through our own experience and that of other congregations and assemblies that pastors who are trained in their



"The Breath of God"

We pray for the fire of the Holy Spirit to rest upon our heads and often upon the heads of the confirmed on Pentecost. What do we expect to happen? Do we really expect to see fire or is this just figurative language?

This is the Sunday designated to talk about the Holy Spirit. Usually when something or someone is designated it keeps them in their place. I believe we often do that with the Holy Spirit because according to the Bible things may happen that we are not ready for.


In the first chapter of Genesis it is written that the Spirit of God moved over the water. This is the first that we hear about "the breath of God". When describing this breath, such words as power and strength come to mind; also new life, as we hear recorded in Ezekiel when the dry bones are resuscitated.

On the Day of Pentecost there was a loud noise which sounded like a strong wind. People then saw tongues of fire which touched each person there assembled. It is recorded that they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and they spoke in other languages. Now how would you have felt if you were there? This does not relate to hardly any experiences that we have had. Some say this will never happen again.

When "the breath of God" blows I believe anything is possible, especially if hearts and minds are open. Isn't it the unknown and the uncontrollable that scare us? We often hear 'be careful what you pray for' as it may happen and more. This is true, but God would not allow anything bad to happen to us if we are praying for more life and vitality from God.

Do you pray for the power of the Holy Spirit to speak through the music you play and sing? We hopefully have all had those goose bump experiences-- this could very well be "the breath of God". Our goal in worship is to help people experience God, and we can't do this on our own. We need the "the breath of God" to take our time and talent and to reach people's hearts.

I challenge you to pray for "the breath of God" to blow in a mighty way every time you play and sing. Without "the breath of God" our music does not go far. What will it do for you and your groups? What will it do for the places where you minister? Do it and find out!!



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

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


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
