The installation of a new Rieger Organ of 59 stops and a new Verdin Carillon of 37 bells in the spring of 2005 at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church will be the focus of this first event of the season. Jeff Brillhart, Director of Music and Fine Arts, will walk through the steps which made this dream a reality and introduce the instruments. An organ and a carillon recital are a part of this event which will include an outdoor luncheon.

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
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

NOTES ON THE REGIONAL CONVENTION in POUGHKEEPSIE

Over 250 AGO members attended the Region II and III convention in Poughkeepsie, NY, June 22 through 25, 2005. Seventeen people associated with the Philadelphia Chapter were in attendance, and some of their comments appear in this *Crescendo*.

Pre-convention activities included the Quimby Young Organists competition. The First Place winner is Scott Myers, a recent Curtis graduate, who will present a public concert sponsored by our chapter this coming March. In the evening, we were treated to a theatre organ concert by Dave Kopp, with theatre organ repertoire, a sing-along, and a 1929 Laurel and Hardy silent movie with organ accompaniment.

This convention featured opportunities for Morning Prayer each day. Some were outstanding, such as the liturgy at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, with much of its music composed by Joseph Bertolozzi, their musician, and a 13-voice choir.

We were treated to outstanding recital programs. The two regional competition winners performed, followed by Aaron David Miller on a 1966 Gress-Miles organ, and Joan Lippincott on the 2002 Fritts at Vassar. The Convocation began with Franck's Chorale in A minor and Reger's Introduction and Passacaglia in D minor, performed by Merellyn Gallagher on the 1967 Gress-Miles 106-rank instrument in Vassar's Chapel, and continued with moving hymnody led by Thomas Schmidt, including a commissioned hymn, and choral works including Franck's Psalm 150, Holst's Psalm 148, and a commissioned work, "Te Deum," composed and conducted by Mark Kristapsons with organ, brass, choir, and The Poughkeepsie Boys' Choir.

The trip to West Point had many interesting facets, including the museum, the security measures to get in (no picture ID, no entrance), finding out there are five chapels and visiting three of them. For me the highlight was the organ concert by Craig Williams in the main chapel. This 380-rank instrument was wonderfully displayed in a program that ranged from Sowerby's "Were You There" to Nancy Plummer Faxon's Toccata, which used the front and back organs in alternation with full reeds and full organ. If it wasn't composed for this instrument, it could have been!

Peter Schickele, the guest speaker at the banquet, was greatly entertaining. If you ever want to pick on a violist, Schickele is a great source — his string of viola jokes was highly entertaining!

John Weaver and Ken Cowan presented thrilling recitals on Friday, and the Camerata Chorale performed in the evening.

Saturday presented the opportunity to worship in Hyde Park at Franklin Roosevelt's church, and to visit the Reformed Dutch Church, Hyde Park, with its 2-manual, 11-rank 1888 Odell organ. It was recently rebuilt to its early condition, including hand-painted stenciling on the pipes. The next stop was Rhinebeck at the Reformed Church with its 2-manual, 10-rank 1892 Frank Roosevelt organ (one of the last he built). The final stop was St. Margaret's Episcopal Church, Staatsburg, with its 2-manual, 11-rank 1893 Chapman organ. This church has two triptych windows from Chartres (13th century) and two Tiffany windows, as well as intricate stenciling on the pipes.

This was a convention marked by hospitality shown by the planners, the hosts, and members of the churches we visited. Next year's national convention in Chicago will have all the above types of opportunities, as well as the typical excitement of the larger groups of people and multitude of occasions for listening, learning, and loving every minute. Start planning now to attend! — **Ethel Geist**
