WANAMAKER ORGAN CRAWL, SATURDAY, March 11, 10:00AM

Lord & Taylor Department Store 13th & Market Street or Chestnut Street, Center City Philadelphia

n March 11, 2006, we will be treated to a real look behind the scenes into the famed Wanamaker Grand Court Organ. We have been given a two hour window from 10 am to 12 noon to explore the heart and soul of this much beloved instrument. It is the largest playing organ in the world and is located in the heart of our very own City of Brotherly Love in the Lord & Taylor department store. We have been asked to meet at "The Eagle" in the center of the Grand Court at 10 am where we will be divided into groups of 20 and taken to various parts of the building where the organ is housed. Three major highlights include up close viewing of the console, a walk through the lower organ, and a tour of the string organ division. You are welcome to bring your cameras and to take photos of this remarkable instrument which continues to be lovingly restored by the curator Curt Mangel and numerous others. Of course we all know and admire Grand Court Organist, Peter Richard Conte, who will be performing a recital at 12 noon. If you have never heard him live, you certainly don't want to miss this opportunity to hear his legendary playing on the one and only Wanamaker Organ.

Because of security issues, you are required to sign up for this event in advance. Your name will be checked off as you enter the string division which is housed in a part of the building which is off limits to the public. DEAN'S LETTER

t has been said that we are the sum of our experiences. This is true in part, but there's more to it than that. Along the way, those experiences have presented us with choices. The choices we did make, we made given what we knew at the time. You can lament those choices all you want, but it won't do you any good! You didn't know then what you do know now.

The aptly named *Pipe Organ Encounter* is intended to be an intersection on the road of the life of young organists. My own life would have progressed quite differently had I had such an experience as a teenager. I suspect this



would be true for many of you reading this. Many POE alumni will testify to the impact this program had on their lives. It's really one of the most significant things the AGO has ever done. The Philadelphia POE is set for June 25 to 30 this summer. Take a look at the brochure included in this mailing of the Crescendo. Spread the good word to young people and their parents. Perhaps you'll participate as a leader. Kudos are due Marcia Mau (First Presbyterian Church, West Chester) for chairing the committee putting the POE together.

On the subject of young organists, twenty-two year old Philadelphia Chapter member Scott Myers played flawlessly and impressively in his winner's recital at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church on Friday, February 3rd. Scott, a Curtis grad and currently working on a masters degree at Juilliard, won both the Philadelphia Chapter competition as well as the Region III competition last summer.

Things are really starting to "heat-up" between the Kimmel Center and the Philadelphia AGO. The leadership at the Kimmel Center is very interested in making the most of their new organ. The leadership of the chapter is excited about their vision. We'll be working in concert with the Kimmel Center on the fifty ways the organ has already been scheduled for the 2006/2007 season so far.

The chapter's Executive Committee was honored to be present for a press event announcing the name of the new organ on February 6. You may have seen the news about this on Channel 6 or in the February 7 *Philadelphia Inquirer*. The organ has been named in honor of Fred J. Cooper, grandfather of chapter member Fred Haas. The late Fred Cooper was an organist and a Philadelphia jeweler. As fate would have it, the grandson who took his name would also go on to become an organist. Thanks Fred Haas for this most significant of contributions!

After the announcement of the name, those attending moved into Verizon Hall to hear the organ played for the first time. Even though it is about one-third incomplete, the sound is clear, full, rich, sonorous, and awesome. You'll be hearing it for yourself soon.

I am honored to announce that the chapter will co-sponsor three solo organ recitals at the Kimmel Center next season! Cherry Rhodes on October 14, Paul Jacobs on February 10, and Wayne Marshall on March 14, have been contracted to play solo organ recitals next season. The Philadelphia Chapter will cover the artist fees for these three concerts, which will also be official chapter events scheduled in addition to regular monthly chapter events. Tickets will be available at a discount to chapter members in a manner yet to be determined. Several educational events are also in the planning stages, including an organ camp for youth this July, purposefully planned after our own Pipe Organ Encounter.

Mark your calendar for Friday, June 9th, the chapter's season finale event: dinner and drinks at the Philadelphia Union League followed by an evening with Peter Schickele, a/k/a PDQ Bach. Plan to bring your spouse, partner, friends, and even clergy! Composer, musician, author, satirist—Peter Schickele is internationally recognized as one of the most versatile artists in the field of music. His works, now well in excess of 100 for symphony orchestras, choral groups, chamber ensembles, voice, movies and television, have given him "a leading role in the ever-more-prominent school of American composers who unselfconsciously blend all levels of American music." (John Rockwell, New York Times)



Delaware Chapter, American Guild of Organists Information Sheet: 2006 Competition

The Vernon deTar Scholarship Competition was established by the Delaware Chapter, American Guild of Organists, to honor the late Dr. Vernon deTar, internationally known organist, church musician, and teacher, for his many contributions to the profession over his long and distinguished career.

The scholarship provides for two prizes annually, one each for a pianist and an organist. This year, prizes include a cash award of \$200, and tuition for a summer, 2006 AGO-sponsored Pipe Organ Encounter. The goal of the competition is to immerse these young musicians in events focusing on the organ, and to foster in them a keen interest in the organ and in church music.

Competition for the Vernon deTar Scholarship is open to piano and organ students who are from 12 to 18 years of age, as of the date of the competition, and who reside within Region III, the Mid-Atlantic Region of the American Guild of Organists: Delaware, Maryland, southern New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia. Applicants must perform at the competition, which will be held at First and Central Presbyterian Church in Wilmington, Delaware on Saturday, April 1 2005, beginning at 11:00 a.m. The minimum repertoire requirements for the competition are as follows: for pianists, one of the Bach two-part inventions or an equivalent piece; for organists, one of the eight "little" preludes and fugues of Bach. Additionally, applicants must also perform a second work, of contrasting nature.

The decision of the judges will be considered final. Judges have the right to award no prize.


