

put together an informative and entertaining presentation which chronicled the history of the Tenth's music ministry, complete with a narrated power-point presentation. This was followed by a vocal recital by world class singers associated with the church. Paul did an incredible job accompanying! There has been some confusion about our Legends concept. I have always been suspicious of conventional wisdom, whatever that is! I recommend two books for your consideration. Klaus Eidam's book, The True Life of Bach (translated from German) is fascinating. Published in 1999, this portrait of Bach and his circumstances shatters many a long- held romantic notion about the composer and draws conclusions with which some may not agree (Eidam is not exactly a musicologist either!). The book receives understandably mixed reviews (3 out of 5 stars at Amazon.com), but it's a great read. Another book I found enjoyable was Bart Ehrman's Misquoting Jesus (2005). Ehrman is a highly respected authority on the New Testament and early Christianity. The book's title says it all, as does his other book, Lost Christianities, which I am just starting to get into. Please do not tell either my musical or my church friends about this.



While at All Saints', he conducted three Deanery choir festivals and served as conductor for Diocesan conventions and anniversary celebrations. From 1963 until 1976, he was Director of Music at Plymouth Meeting Friends School, where his choir sang on TV and radio, as well as traveling to Mexico and cities in the southern U.S. He was President of Mangam Organ Company, Inc. of Philadelphia for 18 years, and is presently the northeastern U.S. representative for Schantz Organ Company, a post he has held for over 35 years.

A. DAVID DEERY

While a student at the Royal School of Church Music Summer Course for the Overseas Students in England, David Deery enjoyed the opportunity to study organ with Christopher Herrick. David's church positions have included St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Phoenixville; Grace Lutheran Church, Pottstown; and, currently, the [Episcopal] Church of St. John, Lower Merion in Bala Cynwyd. He has guided three churches in their purchase and installation of new organs: St. John's Lutheran and St. Peter's Episcopal Churches in Phoenixville and Grace Lutheran Church in Pottstown. David is a member of both the Lehigh Valley and Philadelphia Chapters of the A.G.O.; he has played in the Tuesday noon recital series for our Philadelphia Chapter several times.

MARIA ELLIS

Maria Ellis, who has been the chapter's recording secretary since 1999, was born in The Netherlands, where her early music training was on the family harmonium. Much later, while a graduate student at Yale University, she studied organ with Paul Jordan and other New Haven area organists. Since then she has played as interim organist / choir director for churches in New Haven, in the Philadelphia area, and one summer in Istanbul, Turkey. From 1978-86 she was the organist/choir director at St. Andrews United Methodist Church in Llanerch, and from 1986-2003 choirmaster/organist at St. John the Evangelist's Episcopal Church in Lansdowne. She has played for a number of area churches, including long-term service as interim organist for churches seeking to fill open positions. A member of the chapter since 1976, she was the Registrar for the International Organ Playing Competition at the Third International Congress of Organists held in Philadelphia in August 1977, and coordinated registration for the 2002 National Convention. Other musical activities include singing in the Bryn Mawr Renaissance Choir and the Wayne Oratorio Society. Dr. Ellis is the Executive Director of the American Institute for Yemeni Studies (AIYS) and the project director of the Digital Library for International Research, a joint undertaking of nineteen American overseas research centers including AIYS.

Judith Lang

Judith A. Lang, a longtime member of the AGO, currently serves as Chair of Professional Development for the Philadelphia Chapter. In the past she has been elected to the Executive Board four times, and has served from 1984-1990 as Registrar. She has volunteered in a number of capacities for the AGO, and worked at the ICO, the 2002 National Convention, and taught students for the Wayne Leopold OrganInfo. She was the first to head the Leadership Program for Musicians in Small Churches in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania. She was Organist/Choir Director for 22 years at the Church of the Holy Comforter in

Drexel Hill, and, most recently, at Good Shepherd Church, Hilltown. In addition, she was Head of the Music Department at The Baldwin School in Bryn Mawr for 26 years. She is a graduate of Westminster Choir College, and is currently pursuing an MA in Holistic Spirituality at Chestnut Hill College.

JOSEPH J. LEWIS

Joseph J. Lewis has served as Registrar for the Philadelphia Chapter since 2002. As Registrar he maintains the chapter database of all members, which includes names, addresses, phone and email contact info, institutional affiliations and types of membership. This database also keeps ongoing lists of potential new members and records of deaths, resignations and transfers. He also keeps track of all membership renewals each year, generating new membership forms and then receiving all payments and returned forms, followed by his assembling Financial Reports for the chapter Treasurer and Dues Reports for the national membership office at the AGO HQ in New York City. Also he attends the monthly meetings of the Executive Committee, supplies current updates to officers in a written report, and is responsible for a monthly informational column "Registrar's Corner" in the Crescendo. Another major project is the Membership Directory produced early each year. Joe received his B.S. in Music Education from West Chester University, and a M.M. from Indiana University in Bloomington, majoring in Choral Conducting and minoring in Organ. He studied organ with Robert Elmore, Clyde Holloway and Robert Rayfield, and taught 32 years in Radnor Schools before early-retiring in 1999. He has been organist at St. John's Lutheran Church in Phoenixville PA for 20 years.

STEPHANIE LIEM

Stephanie Liem is a second-year student with Alan Morrison at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia with a full scholarship under the Mrs. Cary William Bok Fellowship. She began studying the organ at the age of nine with Michael Stairs, organist of The Philadelphia Orchestra and of the Church of the Redeemer in Bryn Mawr, PA where she regularly performs. In the spring of 2000, Stephanie was presented as The Philadelphia Organ Quartet's first guest soloist at Longwood Gardens. Thanks to the generous mentoring of Grand Court Organists Peter Conte and Rudolph Lucente, she has played many recitals on the historic Wanamaker Organ in Philadelphia, and at the age of eleven was the youngest to ever play there.

In addition to the organ. Stephanie also studies plano and has studied violin. She sang with the Bryn Mawr Girlchoir's Touring Choir, in which she was their first head chorister and is often a featured part of their tours, and she assisted director Daniel Moriarty in training the Bryn Mawr Girlchoir's younger Resident Choir. Through the Girlchoir, Stephanie has worked with such esteemed artists such as Dr. Bary Rose, formerly of St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and Malcolm Archer, currently of St. Paul's. She has also served as a member of the executive committee of the AGO Philadelphia Chapter from 2002-2004. Stephanie was named the first place winner in the 2003 West Chester University Organ Competition's High School Division, and placed in the 2003 Albert Schweitzer Organ Festival's High School Division. Her past performances include participation in a master class hosted by the American Guild of Organist's (AGO) 2002 national convention and the Association of Young Organists (AYO), a shared concert with Michael Stairs at Allen Organ's Octave Hall in Macungie, PA, concerts with the Delaware County Youth Orchestra, and participation in a masterclass hosted by the National Association of Pastoral Musicians' 2001 Convention. Stephanie frequently gives concerts in the Philadelphia area and Hong Kong. She has one compact disc, Stephanie Liem at the Organ of the Church of the Redeemer; and is featured on the Bryn Mawr Girlchoir's recording, Here I Am, Lord, as well as the new recording from the Bryn Mawr Girlchoir and Boychoir's tour to Chicago this past summer, You Are the New Day.

RUDOLPH A. LUCENTE

Rudolph A. Lucente is Music and Liturgy Consultant at St. Rose Catholic Church in North Wales, PA. In addition to his forty-plus years as a church musician, he is also an Assistant Organist at both the Grand Court Organ (formerly Wanamaker's) in Philadelphia and a holiday staff organist at Longwood Gardens in Kennett Square. Rudy studied organ with Dr. Keith Chapman and also worked with the American/Armenian composer Richard Yardumian. Since their untimely deaths, Rudy has devoted much of his musical activities to the preservation and performance of their works. Mr. Lucente appears frequently as a recitalist and church music clinician, and is a member of the Philadelphia Organ Quartet, an ensemble that performs music arranged for four organs. Rudy has also published several recordings, including Christmas At Atlanta's Fabulous Fox, one of the first organ compact discs released in surround sound.

Abigail Vander Hart Palmisano

Abigail Vander Hart Palmisano is in her 18th year as Director of Music at Carmel Presbyterian Church in Glenside, PA. At Carmel Church she plays the organ for all services and directs the church's five choirs; four vocal choirs ranging from children to adult choir as well as a handbell choir. Abigail is also responsible for the church's concert series, now in its seventh season. Carmel has also been a host church for the Philadelphia Chapter's Tuesday noon organ concerts for the past eight years for which Abigail has been a performer and assistant organizer.

One of Abigail's most recent endeavors includes arranging and hosting a Pedals Pipes and Pizza event at Carmel, which drew a fantastic turn- out. In addition, Abigail also teaches private piano, and served as a volunteer at the National AGO Convention in the summer of 2002. She has also volunteered time to assist in the mailing of the Crescendo.

Abigail received her Masters degree in church music/organ from Northwestern University, Evanston II, and her undergraduate degree from Calvin College in Grand Rapids, MI. She enjoys attending continuing education seminars at Westminster Choir College, Princeton.

GORDON TURK

Gordon Turk is Organist-Choirmaster of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, Wayne, where he directs adult and youth choirs. He is also Organist of the historic Ocean Grove Auditorium in NJ. During his tenure there, he has directed the restoration and development of the instrument to its present size of 170 ranks. He is also the director of the resident chamber music festival, "Summer Stars."

Dr. Turk's concert activities take him throughout the US, Europe, Russia, Ukraine, and Japan. He has appeared as soloist for national and regional conventions of the AGO, and has taught at various denominational conferences. His concert travels have also included teaching in master classes for AGO chapters, colleges, conservatories, and universities, in the US and in Europe.

He has a keen interest, and considerable experience, in the field of organ design and preservation, and is currently involved with consultation projects for new and/or restored pipe organs in three states. He continues his research and study of organ literature, performances practices, and organ history. One such valuable resource opportunity that we have available to as AGO members is the National Pedagogy Conferences. Having participated in these conferences, he heartily recommends them. 
