DEAN'S LETTER

In *My Two-Year-Old Eats Octopus*, Nancy Tringali Piho writes of taking her two-and-ahalf-year-old son to a restaurant in Miami:

"We began our meal by ordering a Ceviche appetizer to share. The large platter contained calamari, octopus, and shrimp 'cooked' in the traditional lemon and lime juices, along with baked plantains and a smattering of local diced sweet onions. It looked absolutely delicious."

"As he had been taught (or perhaps trained) to do after so many previous experiences in restaurants, Willie asked the waiter to bring him a small teaspoon. The waiter smiled as he complied, asking, 'Is he really going to eat that?'

" 'Mmmmm! Octopus!' Willie squealed at the first bite. 'More octopus!'

"His enthusiasm and delight were contagious, attracting attention and comments from diners at several nearby tables.

" 'I can't believe that child is eating Ceviche,' one grandmotherly-looking woman said. 'He loves it!' her companion noted, adding, 'The kids I know would never try something like that.' "

Piho continues her delightful book with a number of suggestions for expanding the palates of children. Regarding her own son, she notes, "The more exposure he has had to different cuisines, the more he has come to understand how to taste 'real' foods and how their flavors contrast with foods that are run-of-the-mill, overly processed, or 'flavorenhanced' with chemical sugars or inexpensive deep-frying. As a result, we have seen him develop a happy appreciation for the joy that food can bring to one's life."

As I listened to the interviews of Piho that surrounded the release of her treatise, I was struck by the descriptions of all-too-common parental attitudes and behavior concerning their children's eating habits. Many parents simply look for the "easy way out." They acquiesce to a child's whining and ultimately end up serving steady diets of fast food, deepfried and overly processed courses, accompanied by the empty calories of many carbonated beverages and other packaged sweets.

Interestingly, the parental behavior toward food is similar to attitudes of some in the church toward music. Far too many leaders acquiesce to the whining about the congregational song that is employed during Advent. They find the "easy way out" and ensure that the hymnody of December is focused not on the penitential preparation, but immediately rushes to Christmas. In another portion of the liturgical year, I encountered a priest who required that all hymnody be chosen from a short list of some 20 hymns, regardless of any connection to lections or the overall service theme. Other worship leaders are rushing to employ overly processed instrumental music, devoid of "substance".

We can see the effects of this fast food culture on the health of the population of these United States. Current projections are that the obesity rate will hit 42%. That increase is a harbinger of the many accompanying medical problems that will face those whose diet has taken the "easy way out." JОЕ

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
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
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A new website makes it easier to search the evergrowing library of organ music, which currently holds over 10,000 tracks from more than 850 albums of music recorded by organists all over the world. Listeners can log in to rate tracks and albums as well as leave comments on the same. Organlive plays albums recorded on pipe, digital, and combination organs played by the world's best concert organists, as well as tracks recorded and submitted by less renowned organists. Included are pairings of organ and orchestra, solo instruments, choir, or vocal solos. The listener is presented with the work title, composer, album title, a link to purchase the album or MP3 online, the organ, it's builder, size, and location, and a link to the specification of the organ being heard, and often a link to public domain copy of the sheet music of the work.

Listeners may browse the entire library searching by work, composer, organist, album, or organ and request tracks to be played. On Sundays the station features hymns, choral anthems, and music of the church. Monday's playlist consists of music from the 19th and 20th centuries. Wednesdays are all-baroque music, and Fridays feature the best music from our library, as rated by the listeners.

The station has been continually funded by the listeners, and an annual budget covering all operating expenses is raised every spring. Likewise, those churches whose music programs take the "easy way out," staying within narrow diets of overly processed or easily digestible music, may also see their health problems soon grow. Such diets do not provide long-standing sustenance. "Fast food" diets in music and liturgy threaten to erode the spiritual and mental health of the population.

Some in leadership capacity may wish to give in to whines of "I didn't know that hymn," or "I don't like that kind of music." Just as young children will bawl incessantly when they do not get the fast food they've seen in advertising, so will some parishioners complain when we offer the best hymnody, organ literature, or choral anthems that span the centuries. As when dealing with the children who may not want to eat their Brussels sprouts, we must not be deterred, but keep offering the balanced diet.

For the health of our nation and our churches, we must do our part to avoid the pitfalls of acquiescence. We must continue to expose our congregations to the best of musical offerings, providing the richness of centuries of musical legacy. Just as Ms. Piho can say, "My two-year-old eats octopus," we should strive for the day when each of us can assert, "My congregation loves Messiaen," "My pastor adores Reger," "My youth choir had a blast singing Schoenberg," "The children in Sunday School delight in singing Bach chorales," or "Our junior high ensemble jammed on Gesualdo."



(sorry - I couldn't resist)

I have the great joy of working with a Hand Bell ensemble at my church, and I think it's fair to say that it's the group with the best attendance and cohesiveness in our music program.



While I got a kick out of a long time and faithful AGO member's quip that his church position gets the 'No Bell Prize,' I personally have to sing the praises of Bells as part of an active music ministry. Our group is a combination of teens and adults and is an ideal vehicle for involving a range of folks who might otherwise not take part in music. They play (about once per month) bell repertoire but also regularly accompany service music and hymns, which lends a delightful extra dimension to worship.

There are many opportunities to experience bells in workshops throughout our area. The American Guild of English Handbell Ringers (AGEHR) has a regional presence providing support, education and workshop opportunities. We're in Region II which includes New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Ontario with a web address of www.area2agehr.org. Collaboration between the AGO and sister organizations in worship and music, such as the AGEHR, can be mutually beneficial - we all grow!

If you don't have bells and are curious, take the workshop offered at the Jumpstart or in other venues - or seek out ringers in your community to show you the ropes. If you are not in a position to plunge in with deep pockets to 4 octaves of Schulmerich, Malmark or Whitechapel bells, then perhaps you might get your feet wet with Tone Chimes or Hand Chimes, available through the same companies and Suzuki, among others.

One final note - I was extremely proud of a young man in our group, now a college sophomore, who won one of the ACMP Young Musician awards in 2009. He continues to ring enthusiastically and has become remarkably skilled - it's delightful to watch him in action!
