## *The Real Meaning of Renewal . . .*

Very often a title like the one above would be followed by carefully diagrammed dictionary entries for the word, in this case Renewal. But I'm not going to do that. Instead, I'd rather just think out loud a bit about renewal in reference to our chapter.

In one sense, we are now entering a "Period of Renewal" during which we will all get a new and improved set of forms asking us to sign on as chapter members for the upcoming year (July 01 through June 30). And for me that will mean making sure that those forms don't get lost in the pile of papers on my desk! And hopefully, also like me, everyone will find a few moments in their busy schedules to fill out those renewal membership forms and get them back as soon as possible.

But that's really only the beginning of the process of "renewal." Several times during this first year of my term as dean, I've stated that the greatest asset of the chapter is its membership, and I continue to believe that statement. And while it is indeed important that every member continue to support the chapter by membership renewal, I'd like to suggest some other "renewals" for your consideration.

First, and in my opinion most important among those, is a most pleasant task requested of our membership: attendance at chapter events. Our program committee presented a wonderful slate of events this past year, and is planning an even more aggressive schedule for the coming year, including several programs specifically for young people. The programs, workshops and concerts that we present are a continuing response to members' comments and suggestions, and the committee works tirelessly to address stated needs, provide world-class performances, and uphold to the fullest our mission statement of "bold, public visibility" of the organ. The chapter's programs are the most significant line item in our budget, and it is for these public events that we use the bulk of the financial resources that members contribute to the chapter. So I'm asking everyone as they fill out their renewal forms to make a mental note and commitment to try to attend as many chapter events as possible, realizing the many schedule conflicts and commitments that organists have.

Next, I'd like to suggest another equally-pleasant task: involvement. We have many volunteers (including the officers, directors and committee members) who give countless hours to the chapter's work, but this does not mean that we can't use more help. Anyone who has been to our annual January Jumpstart knows how much goes into presenting this landmark multiple-topic workshop, which presents a lot of opportunities for member involvement. Our Tuesday Noon series continues to provide a major outreach opportunity, and members can either offer their venue and/or themselves as a performer. This series allows many of us who are not necessarily recitalists to come before an audience and just share our love of the instrument and the music we like to make on it. There is no shortage of involvement options in the chapter – and perhaps this is your year to do something a little different as a chapter member!

Thirdly, my suggestion is one of those that while I'm "supposed" to mention as dean, I do so more as a fellow member, and that is the patron program that we have in place. Over the years, we have continued to have significant patron gifts included with membership renewal, and members have contributed generously to this aspect of the chapter's financial resources. The executive committee uses those resources with great care and responsibility. Even so, expenses for concert venues, performers, receptions (an important aspect of networking and member interaction), and other related costs have gone up, and with careful financial management and member generosity, we have managed to maintain our excellent programming and smooth chapter operation. The patron program is an important aspect of chapter finances, and I would like to offer my sincere appreciation to those who have participated in it over the years, while encouraging others who may be able to do so to consider it this year.

Finally, I'd like to close this message and this season with a plea for your assistance in helping us grow the chapter. And this time of renewal couldn't be better for that purpose. As we consider the benefits of membership to ourselves, it isn't difficult to extend that consideration to others we may know who are not currently members. Bring colleagues and friends to chapter events, and encourage others to peruse not only our website but that of the National office as well. We have a great chapter, located in a great area of the country, and we can be proud of who we are, the mission statement we profess, and the programs we present!!

If you wish to remain on the Chapter Substitute list, please make sure you complete section 5 of the new form. In order to save space, we have not re-printed the AGO Code of Ethics. You will also notice we've updated several other areas in the renewal form and provided the ability to subscribe to E-Crescendo and go Green, which helps the chapter realize savings in printing and postage.

As announced in the March issue of Crescendo, AGO National has announced new dues rates for the 2012-2013 season. Please remember that the AGO fiscal year begins on July 1, 2012 and runs through June 30, 2013. The new membership rates are:

CHAPTER FRIEND (Non-voting)	\$50 (non-organists; organists and choral conductors are not eligible; no TAO)

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**CHAPLAIN'S CORNER****"I Am the vine, you are the branches"***John 15:5 NRSV*

The summer is a good time to review our programs, to review this past season. We have a foundation, standards, on which we build programs and our lives. Is it possible to ask some basic questions to evaluate what we have been doing?

- 1) Do you still have energy for this part of the program? Or Do the participants still seem to be interested?
- 2) If you cannot answer yes to these questions, then it may be time to revamp or cut it. Is there another way to accomplish the goals?
- 3) What other ways would make it more interesting for you and the participants?

All of us are experiencing changes in our lives. Some we may not welcome or enjoy others may be healthy and positive. In the church world today there are many changes. The churches and programs that seem to be thriving are those willing to take risks and try new ways of presenting the message.

Church is being redefined in ways that do not look or feel the same. It may even feel uncomfortable. As musicians it often becomes difficult to do the music we used to do. This does not mean that quality should go by the way side.

In this passage from the Gospel of John, it points out that new life does not come without pruning. It is hard for us "church people" to hear that God expects change from us. Church leaders who have been around a while are having a difficult time adapting to change.

Change involves healthy self esteem and realizing we do not have to do it all. It is about learning to work together. I attended a performance of the Brahms' Requiem in Ardmore where a couple of church choirs from different denominations joined together. They have been doing this for a number of years. This is something that churches are being encouraged to do. We can do far more together than we can by ourselves.



If churches do not prune they may die. It is the same with the work we do. The world is changing so fast, we may not be able to keep up with it, but we need to look at how it impacts us and the work we do; look at how we engage people, as it is not the same as it used to be.

Take the summer to review and refresh yourself. Do not be afraid to think outside of the box. As we consider pruning, look ahead with hope to the new life that can come forth. The message of the Bible does not change nor do our standards, but the way it is presented to engage people may need to change. Peace.

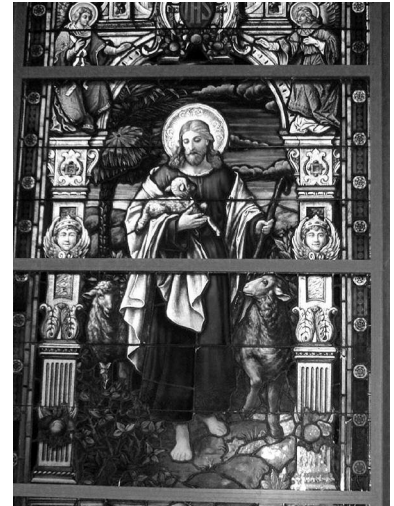
### Robert Johnston

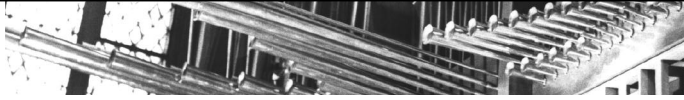
