October 23, 2011 - 4:00 pm - Overbrook Presbyterian Church

This month Richard Elliott returns to the Philadelphia area to perform in concert at Overbrook Presbyterian Church on the recently restored Clarence H. Geist, M.P. Moller Organ, Opus 6800. Through funding via a capital campaign, the organ is fully operational again and playing at full capacity. Works to be performed include Bach's Passacaglia in C Minor and Lemare's transcription of Wagner's Prelude to Die Meistersinger. Also Dr. Elliott will perform some of his own arrangements and works associated with the Mormon Tabernacle organ. Previously Dr. Elliott performed at Overbrook in 1992.



From his biography, Dr. Elliott "is

Principal Organist at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, where he participates in the daily recital series on the famed Æolian-Skinner organ and accompanies the Mormon Tabernacle Choir on their weekly radio and TV broadcast, 'Music and the Spoken Word.' As accompanist for the Tabernacle Choir he has performed in many of the world's great halls and appeared on numerous television and radio programs such the NBC 'Today Show,' the 'CBS Morning Show' and 'A Prairie Home Companion.'"

Dr. Elliott holds degrees in organ performance from the Curtis Institute of Music (1980) and the Eastman School of Music. He appears on eighteen recordings with the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, two solo organ recordings, and three organ recordings in collaboration with his colleagues at the Tabernacle.

Other local connections include: three years as an assistant organist to Keith Chapman at the John Wanamaker Department Store; organist at Swarthmore Presbyterian Church and assistant organist at St. David's Episcopal Church in Wayne.

This is a ticketed event since tickets are being made available to the public. Chapter members are entitled to 2 tickets. Tickets will be available at the door but can be reserved in advance by calling or emailing Dennis Elwell at: 215-877-2744 ext. 4 or elwell@overbrookpresb.org. Please note - this is the first year that cards were NOT mailed to members because we have the capacity to check membership with our constantly updated software maintained by the registrar.



Directions

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

What Makes A Great Choir Sound Great?

ver seen a great movie? Been to a great restaurant? Gazed into a great work of art at a museum? How would you describe these experiences? What was it that made them stand out in your mind? Metaphorical expressions such as "the cream of the crop" or "crème de la crème" as the French would say distinguish the mediocre from the sublime; but whereas cream is produced by separating the butterfat from whole milk, achieving richness in art is a bit more complex.

Specifically in choral singing, for the average volunteer choir whose members may or may not have studied music, greatness seems like a noun reserved for icons such as the Mormon Tabernacle. The fact of the matter is: every church choir has the potential to climb the steps to Parnassus with a certain amount of success with a little commitment on the part of the singers and some specific vocal training from the director. I will not attempt to address the issue of commitment here, either vocally or in terms of attendance, though I am a seasoned veteran of vocal volunteerism and its "creative challenges". But as to the latter, I can offer some insight regarding vocal training.

First of all, it is important that every rehearsal begin with a warm-up. Many directors forego this in the interest of time. That is a mistake. Vocalizes to a singer is like leg stretches for a runner. You need to limber up before the race. Warm-ups should include breathing exercises and vocalizes. Since time is of the essence, you can incorporate specific passages in the music you are working on and create vocalizes from them (two for a dollar so-to-speak).

The main focus of these exercises should be a supported sound which incorporates both chest voice and head voice and most of all, well-rounded, pure vowels. Especially in regard to vowels, this cannot be emphasized enough. I have heard many a lovely choir sing rather well if only it hadn't been for those darn vowels and gooey diphthongs. Aside from the obvious esthetics, rounded vowels are essential to keeping in tune and on pitch (in addition to solid breath support).

A good way to begin a warm-up session is with some costal and back stretches followed by deep yoga breaths: this will not only energize your singers physically, but will help them to focus. If you have young singers, the "tree pose" (standing on one



foot, stretching to the ceiling and breathing in) is a really good posture/breathing exercise. Five minutes of these is well worth the time you will save by plowing through the first piece because everyone's mind is somewhere else.

Follow these with some sustained, half notes on "pure, Italian" ah, eh, ee, oh, and oo vowels moving up half steps after each set, then proceed to a passage from one of the pieces you will be working on during rehearsal. Look for phrases that require long, sustained breaths or that have lots of consonants for practicing clear diction. This is also a great way to segue into the first piece you will be working on.

Listen carefully to the sound your singers are making in these exercises and make sure the vowels are free of "regional accents"; that the jaw is open and relaxed; and the mask of the face is lifted. Moreover be aware of your own facial expressions as you conduct. The choir will mirror you so if you want a bright sound, make sure your face shines! There is nothing more uninspiring to a singer than a director with a "non-committal" expression; save that for the poker game.

Finally, practice looking up from the music. I've made up many a fun game with my young singers for this one (actually the adults enjoy these too). Throwing in one of these every now and then keeps your singers on their toes and can be just what the doctor ordered after a long rehearsal.

So, what makes a great choir great? Begin with some solid warm-ups and discover just "how great they art"!
