It's that time again

DECEMBER 2011

... when all of us experience the myriad of changes in the world around us. The weather is changing, perhaps quicker than we had anticipated, and once again holiday decorations jumped out from just about everywhere before the end of October. I sometimes wonder if the increasing velocity of the pace of society is really a good thing or not. There are all kinds of edito-



rials and philosophies talking about the benefits of taking time to "smell the flowers" but after a while we see so much of this that I think we tend to ignore that advice. In talking with many chapter members and other officers and directors, I've found that almost to a person everyone has an even more aggressive November and December schedule coming up, and I would have to say that my own schedule is no exception.

But if there is one piece of advice that we could all benefit from, it would be taking some time out for ourselves, especially with colleagues facing the same church, concert, school or family obligations through the end of the year. Many of us will perform in concerts; many will attend concerts. Most of us will have significant church responsibilities; others have school "winter" programs to plan, rehearse and present. So the last thing we might want to do is go to yet another "performance" event. Not to worry! In the month of December we don't have a performance event scheduled, as our Program Committee has had the wisdom to leave December open in that regard. However, we do have the annual holiday gathering, which is a perfect opportunity to be with friends and colleagues in a purely social environment. This is always a fun time, and is usually well attended. A more detailed description from the Sub-Dean is elsewhere in the newsletter.

On a more personal note, I always look upon this time of year as a kind of "new beginning." I'm not one for New Year's resolutions, as I don't want to contribute to the statistics of those who keep them for about ten days or so. Rather, I think of the people whose lives I might touch and who might touch my life in the coming weeks. This is a "kinder, gentler" time for many and, for those of us who serve religious institutions, it is also a time of even more profound responsibility. I remember once seeing an ad for a church service indicating that they would be presenting "obscure music of Christmas." I had two thoughts almost immediately: the first was that it would not interest me in the least, and the second more serious thought was that for the person possibly trying to re-align a troubled life situation, "obscure" music of Christmas (or any other kind) isn't going to help, and in fact may drive them away.

As I consider the amazing and sobering fact that 2012 will mark a half century of my life in church music, I take pride in the fact that I've never played a program of "obscure music" at Christmas (or any other time). And while I agree that part of our mission is to educate the general public and assist in broadening horizons of music in general and organ music in particular, I think it's important to consider how and when we do that.

A good example is the concert played by Dr. Richard Elliott that we just co-presented at Overbrook Presbyterian Church. Rick played a program that was by and large very listenable by anyone there, and while there were a couple of selections that would have been unfamiliar to many, his descriptions of the music and the composers along with the careful order of the pieces made it entertaining as well as educational.

nce again we enter another Advent-Christmas season. When we listen to the news, there often is a larger percentage of "Bad News". If one really likes the news you can begin watching or listening at 4:00 in the afternoon right on through to 7:00 p.m. Of course on some stations they then discuss it.

After a period of time it becomes normal, what we expect. But what do we do with it or what can we do with it? It can bring us to a point of not being able to see, hear or touch anything that seems positive or healthy. Life can become mundane or lived by rote. After so many pieces of "bad news" it can become all that we expect.

This is when I say it is time to stop waiting for "bad news" and begin looking, straining to hear, to touch "good news". Could it be that the art of waiting is lost or has become more difficult? The season of Advent is of course about waiting. Most of the time it seems that God does not work very fast.

When will this health problem be over? When will I find that position? When will the choir learn that piece of music? Why can't I get that passage into my fingers? I believe that WE are usually the problem. Remember that expression, "if you can't play it slow, you can't play it fast"? It is about being ready.

God allows things to happen when we are ready. Our choirs will have a piece learned when they have learned it. We will have the passage learned when we have



learned it slowly. Being ready for anything involves our whole being. We may be able to sing or play the notes, but maybe there is something else going on in our lives that is not allowing us to be ready.

Part of waiting is remembering.
Remembering that good piece of news.
Remembering that there will be changes.

Remembering those special people around you that let you know that you are not alone. Isn't waiting easier when someone waits with you?

During this season practice waiting. Look for what is positive and healthy in the people and circumstances around you. Tell the people you work with and yourself what is working. Wait with others. Maybe while we do these things we will experience the "good news" as well as being the "good news" to others.



Consider Taking a Guild Exam!

everal years ago Joyce Shupe Kull, AGO National Councilor for Education. presented "100 Strategies for Successful AGO Certification." These are some general comments that especially caught my attention. The entire list, which contains well-

ordered general strategies and specific thoughts for each of the exams, will be available at the January JumpStart. If you have ever thought about preparing for an exam, consider these:

- Enlist a study buddy. Meet weekly and hold each other accountable for assignments (and/or help form a group to work together).
- Acquire good equipment: buy new organ shoes, get a good metronome, and recording equipment (not necessarily expensive).
- Record your exam many times, starting when it is NOT yet ready. (It will tell you what the examiners will hear.)
- Good sight-readers are made, not born. (She gives a number of tips for mastering sightreading.)
- Hymns are "job one" for church musicians. One can never lead hymns too well!
- Transposition scares many of us, but seven steps make it more accessible (items 38-44 on her list).
- Know the grading sheet very well! You'll know what the examiners listen for.


Joyce Kull's last two Strategies are:

- Take pride in your accomplishments!
- You have facilitated the first three of the four purposes of the AGO:

- 1. To advance the cause of organ and choral music...
- 2. To improve the proficiency of organists and choral conductors.
- 3. To evaluate, by examination, attainments in organ playing, choral techniques, conducting.... and to grant certificates to those who pass such examinations...

From my own experience – I gained more from preparing for the exam than I ever thought possible - and most of what I learned has stayed with me, as a platform for going further. Give it a try!

Andrew Hauze is one of our chapter members. In 2009 he received the AAGO and ChM certificates in the same year and with distinction! In an article in the November 2009 Crescendo, he commented:





Jeremy Begbie writes in his recent work, Resounding Truth, of Pentecostal Polyphony with these words: 'As Jesus' disciples could understand one another, though speaking in different tongues, on the day of Pentecost, so I feel music helps us to deepen our sense of human community and compassion, regardless of one's faith.' I am very grateful to the AGO for the outstanding certification program; it has enabled me (like so many others) to continue my education in a structured way, and to always strive to achieve another goal."

Andrew has now accomplished another goal – in 2011 he received the FAGO certificate, also with distinction.
