DEAN'S LETTER

Just When You Thought You Could Rest

s we approach the month of March, looking at the calendar for some will perhaps be a little stressful. Having just started to catch our breath after a busy holiday season in November and December, we barely



have a moment to rest before embarking on Spring concerts, Lent and Easter programs, weddings, or any of the other obligations that we organists seem to collect from one season to another.

The good news is that our chapter programs over the next few months are wonderful opportunities to spend some time together away from those obligations. We make every effort to avoid conflict with as many other programs and concerts as possible, and as a result have come up with a calendar of events that should allow for a large portion of our membership to attend. While all these terrific events are listed elsewhere in this issue, one in particular comes to mind that bears mention: the May event at St. Clement's Church.

During the past few months, quite a few folks have remarked that they would like to see a program or two in a major Philadelphia city church. Our program committee had already made the decision to revive our "Legends of Philadelphia" series - highlighting historically significant locations in the city. This season's offering at St. Clement's has a number of unique elements. The organ is one of the finest examples of an "American Classic" instruments, but with a definitely-English accent! In addition, another historic instrument is being installed in the church to function in a dual role: the chapel organ as well as the antiphonal for the main organ. The artist will be Wanamaker Grand Court Organist Peter **Richard Conte**, who also directs the renowned music program at St. Clement's. While every month up to and including June has a worthwhile program for us to enjoy, I would also like to mention a significant bi-annual event taking place this July: the AGO National Convention. The website for the convention describes all of the concerts, lectures, workshops, reading sessions, and several special events taking place between July 01 and July 07 in Nashville, Tennessee. The Philadelphia Chapter is always well-represented, and both our Sub-Dean Tim Evers and myself will be there. I would encourage any chapter member or friend who is considering attending to review the information on events and registration procedures in The American Organist or on the AGO national website (the convention has its own section easily accessible there).

I'd like to offer a brief update on the many changes and updates that have been a part of the chapter's operation since last September. We're getting a good handle on the new database software - but we're still learning many of its capabilities and how it can help all of us. The issue of membership renewal will come up again this year, and the executive committee is committed to providing our membership with sufficient alternatives to meet everyone's needs and preferred methods. The Program Committee is very likely the best we have had in a long time, and it has recruited a large and diverse group of members who are working diligently to plan many enjoyable and meaningful events for us. Communications, including Crescendo as well as general public relations, are evolving quickly into an effective mechanism for accomplishing our mission of Bold, Public Visibility. The website will undergo some changes in the coming months as well to better serve both members and the general public who views it. We will provide regular updates to everyone, but know that these tasks are somewhat daunting in that they are happening simultaneously. But happy tasks they are to those who are accomplishing them! Our officers and committee members are amazing, and it is a privilege to work with them on everyone's behalf.

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VOX HUMANA HOW TO \$\$AVE MONEY ON MUSICAL SCORES

as your Church's music budget been reduced in these days of shrinking Church membership? You may be able to save considerable sums of money by using a lending library. The village church where I play the organ presents special programs of music throughout the year. We couldn't even think about programming this repertory if we had to purchase all the musical scores, instrumental parts AND, of course, pay the required professional musicians a fair wage. Although I sometimes bug my colleagues in Wayne for a loan, I have learned that there are other options for borrowing musical scores and perhaps the best lending library is here in Philadelphia! This list is not an exhaustive survey, but I have listed a few of the lending libraries I have used as well as examples of scores I have borrowed.

The Free Library of Philadelphia (www.freelibrary.org) has a large Music Department and a helpful staff to guide you through the borrowing process. In addition to their regular collection of scores and organ music, the Free Library houses the Edwin A. Fleisher Collection of Orchestral Music and the Drinker Choral Music Library. For a reasonable fee, one can rent vocal and orchestral scores and orchestra parts. In the past, I have rented the orchestral score and a set of parts for Vivaldi's Gloria and Haydn's Creation. Most recently, I was able to rent 35 choral scores for Saint-Saëns' Christmas Oratorio from Drinker, walk a few steps to Fleisher, and rent the orchestral score and parts. Total cost for all these materials was approximately \$100, including Drinker's annual membership fee! It is always a good idea to reserve works well in advance of the performance date.

If your church has small instrumental ensembles, you may also want to search the Chamber Music collection of the Free Library. These works may be borrowed with a small deposit that is refunded when the music is returned. Some of the works I have borrowed from this collection are Corelli's *Concerto Grosso, Op. 6, No.8* (*Christmas Concerto*) and a wonderful woodwind quintet arrangement of dances by Rameau.

Sometimes the Free Library might not own what you need. The Bagaduce Music Lending Library (www.bagaducemusic.org), the New Amsterdam Singers Rental Library (www.nasingers.org/rental-catalogue), and the New York Choral Society (www.nychoral.org/outreach/music-rental) are three other sources to check. One needs to consider the membership fee, possible rental per score, and postage to determine how cost-effective these sources are. For example, I was able to borrow Schoenberg's Weihnachtsmusik from the Bagaduce Music Lending Library at a savings over the purchase price; however, Buxtehude's cantata, In dulci jubilo was not inexpensive because of the charge per vocal score. But for a work that the choir will probably not repeat, the church still realized a savings.

Three good online sources for downloading scores are the Choral Public Domain Library (www.cpdl.org), the International Music Score Library Project (www.imslp.org) and Musicaneo (www.musicaneo.com/). I was able to upload a score of d'Indy's *Suite in Old Style* from Musicaneo for about \$9.00. This was the only way to obtain a score of this work.

The congregation of **The First Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia** was established as the "Mother Church" of American Presbyterianism in 1698. The building in which the congregation currently resides was built in 1872 as the Second Presbyterian Church. The two congregations merged in 1948, retaining the name of First.


The first instrument in this building was installed in the gallery by the Hutchings Company. An almost entirely new instrument was installed in 1926 by Austin Organs, retaining a handful of Hutchings stops. Over the succeeding decades, the instrument was rebuilt and added to by various builders - most notably by Moller in 1953, with the addition of the Chancel Organ. In 1999-2000, a completely new gallery instrument (incorporating many of the beloved color stops which made the previous instrument famous) was built by Reuter. Most recently, the 1953 Moller Organ in the Chancel has been given a face-lift - replacing approximately half of the pipework with stops salvaged from 1901 Haskell organ of the former Chambers Wylie Memorial Church on Broad Street (now Broad Street Ministries).


The complete instrument can be described as a clearly American organ with a distinct English flavor. In addition to its mystical soft voices and earth-shattering reed choruses, it now has a vast palette of mezzo-forte stops, and is at home playing just about every genre of literature.

Forks of the Brandywine Presbyterian Church seeks an organist to give leadership to the worship services of Forks of the Brandywine Presbyterian Church, EPC by using the organ to lift the congregation in music for the praise of God. The organ is a two-manual instrument built by the Dutch Craft Organ Company of New Jersey.

Responsibilities: Subject to review and adjustment in conjunction with the Director of Music, the following constitute the major responsibilities of the Organist:

We are happy to advertise positions available for churches in the Greater Philadelphia Area as a free service. We need to request that all ads stay within a 250 word limit – applicants should be directed to the church for further information. We would also be very grateful if churches encourage their organists to join our chapter – and many include dues payment as a contract perk!

1. Select organ music at all Sunday worship services, mid-week worship occasions, and all special celebrations of worship where the organ is the primary instrument used.

2. Accompany vocalists and instrumentalists as scheduled by the Choir Director or Pastor.

3. Provide organ music for weddings and funerals held at the church when the organ is the primary instrument used. Fees for these services are not provided by the church, but are honorariums from couples and families at an amount determined by church policy. The use of the organ by another organist requires special permission.

4. Advise and assist, as requested, in providing for qualified substitutes for all absences.

5. As needed, provide periodic reports specifying maintenance needs to the Choir Director and Board of Trustees.

Working Conditions

1. The Organist shall rehearse sufficiently to maintain a high quality of music at the organ.

2. The Organist serves under the supervision of the Director of Music and Worship Team. An annual performance review will be done with the Choir Director.

3. Five (5) weeks/Sundays off per year plus other times agreed upon with the Choir Director. An arrangement for substitutes is the responsibility of The Organist.

4. Cooperate with all staff and the congregation so that the music ministry is enhanced within the life of the church.

5. The Organist shall have permission to conduct private organ lessons and make the organ available to qualified students.

Skills and Qualifications

1. Sufficient keyboard ability to sight read hymns, liturgy, and easy anthem accompaniments.

2. Knowledge of church worship traditions and a theological understanding of the church sufficient to appropriately advise and assist in selecting music and texts for worship.

3. Experience as a "team player" in a church setting, or similar environment, working with staff, musicians, and volunteers.



What Wondrous Love is This - 1811

Tune Name: Wondrous Love Text: Anon. Music: James Christopher (uncertain)

This hymn is thought to have originated in the Appalachian Mountains where many settlers were of Scottish and Irish descent. The words were first published in <u>A General Selection of the Newest and Most</u> <u>Admired Hymns and Spiritual Songs Now in Use</u> in 1811 in Lynchburg, Virginia. In 1835 William Walker published the text together with the tune we now know as Wondrous Love in <u>The Southern Harmony</u>, the first edition of his shape note system hymn collections. Walker, born in 1809 in South Carolina, helped to bring the folk music he grew up with to print.

What wondrous love is this, O my soul, O my soul,... What wondrous love is this that caused the Lord of bliss To bear the dreadful curse for my soul, for my soul...

Folk hymns often involved a fair amount of repetition in order that pieces could be learned by rote. The inherent simplicity also has a stark poignancy and a beautiful, plaintive feel. The tune Wondrous Love has a modal feel to it, and is often described as 'haunting.' The author of the tune is in some doubt - this may have been a tune passed down through generations, and therefore changing as it went, and eventually written down. Walker credits James Christopher of Spartansburg, SC, in one of the later editions of <u>Southern Harmony</u>.

To God and to the Lamb I will sing, I will sing,..... To God and to the Lamb, who is the great 'I AM.' While millions join the theme, I will sing....

As we approach Lent and Easter, we can embrace this gem of American hymnody. It can be something to meditate quietly with. It can be sung very simply, or quite powerfully, especially in the final verse that speaks of freedom from death. It is also a beautiful and comforting possible hymn for a funeral or for use during the Month of All Souls.

And when from death I'm free, I'll sing on, I'll sing on,.... And when from death I'm free, I'll sing and joyful be, And through eternity I'll sing on...
