his month's event marks the sixth church featured as part of the Philadelphia Legends series.

Past Philadelphia churches highlighted include: First Presbyterian, Christ Church, Tenth Presbyterian, Gloria Dei Church (Old Swedes), and First Baptist Church.



St. Clement's Church was founded as a neighborhood Episcopal Parish in 1855. One of three Episcopal Churches designed by architect John Notman and built between 1847 and 1859, the other two being Church of Holy Trinity Rittenhouse Square and St. Mark's Church Locust Street, St. Clement's was designed in the Romanesque Revival architecture to reflect its Low Church worship. Beginning in 1869 it was influenced by its leadership and the Oxford Movement to adopt many of the liturgical practices associated with the Catholic Revival. The building is constructed of brownstone and its location on the southwest corner of the intersection presented a major design issue. Should the main entrance face westward into the middle of the block or should it have an eastward orientation? This would have reversed the interior as well, so Notman compensated for it by retaining the apse on the east side of the church and incorporating it into the main façade. In 1929, the church was raised onto steel beams and moved forty feet westward (!) to accommodate the widening of 20th Street.

The present organ is a 1914 Austin installed at a cost of \$11,900 and included "Swell boxes of double construction, 3 1/2 inches thick', rendering a more effective crescendo/diminuendo of the enclosed pipe voices." A new Austin console was installed in 1948 and in the 1960's additional tonal work was

completed. In 1997, a comprehensive restoration project took place involving multiple firms. This process was wrapped up with the installation of a new console built by Roger Colby of Tennessee.

s we begin the season of spring, which this year has been more of a gentle glide from a mild winter, everyone looks forward to warmer weather, hopefully some vacation "down time" after busy church, school and concert responsibilities, and, most importantly, AGO chapter membership renewal. We



have been fortunate to have a broad membership base that makes the Philadelphia chapter one of the most respected in the country. Our programs are first-rate, and we have continued to uphold the mission of service and education in the community.

As we prepare to close out this year of the chapter's activities for a "summer break," there are several chapter and organ-related activities that will take place. The annual meeting and chapter dinner is also planned immediately following to make scheduling easier on everyone. We have had excellent attendance at our annual dinner, and it is always a popular and fun event.

This is also the year of the National Convention, which is being held in Nashville, TN. Our chapter is always well-represented at national conventions, and we will be hosting a small reception one of the evenings. Sub-Dean Tim Evers and myself will be there along with a number of our members. The AGO National website has complete information on the convention.

Finally, and perhaps most important, we will be embarking on our annual membership renewal process. The renewal form has been carefully re-designed to make it easy for our members to complete, and also easier for us to transfer any information changes to our database. We are not switching to an online system this year in anticipation of a potential change at the national level. Our executive committee felt that this would be confusing and inconvenient. Once again, please remember that you, our members, are the chapter's greatest asset, and your support of the chapter and participation in our events are the lifeblood of the chapter's activities. You are also the best recruiters of new members, and we need your assistance in getting the word out about the benefits and enjoyment of chapter membership.

"The ABC has a lot of personal connection to me since I was in it since I was eight. I have been working in this choir now for 15 years and I have seen the choir grow and have a wonderful impact on our nation and all over the world. I have never witnessed such hard work from a group of boys who dedicate much of each Saturday (10 -2, or longer with upcoming productions.) We can always use more singers - the choir used to have 90 boys (when I sang,) but now it is about 35 less. The boys have the opportunity to travel as an ensemble, including taking part in religious pilgrimages that can make for very positive life-long memories. When I was with the choir, one place that really stood out for me was Rome, Italy, where we sang for Pope John Paul II. As a singer I fell in love with the bookmark words written by St. Teresa of Avila. As a boy in the choir, I walked the footsteps of St. Teresa in Avila on the walls of the city. I really felt that I was blessed to be in such a beautiful country on a wonderful spiritual pilgrimage."The choir's choice of repertoire is appealing to all, ranging from Pergolesi's Stabat Mater to Spirituals like Wade in the Water. I have grown so much from this choir - it was the number one motivating factor that led me to pursue a musical career. As a private teacher and staff person with the summer arts camp 'Young Artists Musicians Program,' I hope to inspire more boys to join this wonderful program!"

The organ is a 38-rank, 3-manual pipe organ made by the Schantz Organ Company. It has two digital 32' stops in the pedal division and includes 99 levels of memory. There is a Zimbelstern and the organ includes 15 ranks of pipes from our previous instrument, made by the Austin Organ Company, and 23 ranks of new pipework made by Schantz. The organ pipes are in two chambers alongside the Choir loft in the Sanctuary; the Swell division is closest to



Darlington Street, and the Great and Choir Divisions are in the chamber inside the Sanctuary. The new tonal openings facing the congregation are the result of improvements made to the Sanctuary as a part of the organ project, and enable the organ to speak directly to the congregation.




As an added bonus, lunch is going to be available for \$5 for anyone who wants to stay after the concerts – or it can be take out for folks that are interested in a bite but have to run.

ur chapter is incredibly diverse. Several of our members have multi-faceted positions in large churches as well as busy concert schedules, and smile out at us from the pages of the TAO Concert Artist pages. Others have two or more jobs in various fields and manage to include a part time music career while juggling plenty of life in the balance. Still others are happy to be interims or substitutes, playing when possible but opting out of a year round commitment. ALL are important! And all of us can help to inspire those we serve to embrace a more active role in music ministry.

Wonderful Opportunities for Cross Pollination



I want to suggest how wonderful it can be to incorporate instrumental musicians into liturgical music whenever possible. Many of you probably already do this and much more, but here are just a few ideas that I keep coming back to:

- Find simple melodies and descants for young instrumentalists to play along on, or write them according to the ability of the performers. They may play on only one hymn, or they may be up to the challenge of the entire worship service.
- If you have Bb, Eb or other non-C instruments, begin putting together a folder for each of transposed melodies, descants, etc. Many publishers also have these available to compliment hymnals.
- Find Choral Octavos that incorporate various instruments, and USE them! They are a wonderful way to bring people (and often generations) together
- Write new settings that incorporate whatever instruments you have available I have done arrangements that include Handbells, clarinet, brass, flute, oboe, strings, percussion, and/or bassoon, depending on who is available
- Consider having instruments double challenging choral parts give a different tone to each section, so perhaps flute with sopranos, clarinet with altos, bassoon with basses, etc. It lets more people become involved and it can give the choir extra needed support.
- Don't forget that percussion can be a simple yet effective entré into music ministry for young people who might not yet be comfortable singing - as a music therapist I have everything from Djimbes to rain sticks, finger cymbals to wood blocks, all of which can work in certain hymns and pieces. ('Now the Green Blade Rises' is particularly nice with finger cymbals, for instance.)
- If you haven't discovered the Taize series, which includes both choral and instrumental books, these are perfect for anything from the simple to the elaborate. Each setting has many layers of possibility, all according to who you have available. I like to tell my singers and players that it's like a wonderful musical puzzle, with many possible solutions.
- · Be Creative!!

One final note - you can provide much needed support to our chapter in large, medium, and small ways: Large consider becoming a patron (or continuing,) or even making memorial gifts to the chapter in someone's honor; Medium - RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP as soon as it comes, and encourage colleagues to join; Small - consider subscribing to e-Crescendo, thus saving the chapter with postage and print costs - every little bit helps!
